

As president of United Astronomy Clubs of NJ, I'd like to extend my greetings to all of you for this 2006 year. As you know, the mission of UACNJ is to promote and support amateur astronomy in New Jersey, and also to provide educational programs for the public.

We accomplish the first part by representing our member clubs with astronomical displays at major area events. These include our presence at the Rockland Astronomy Club's North East Astronomy Forum (NEAF), the Amateur Astronomers Association of Princeton's Jersey StarQuest, the Bucks-Mont Astronomical Association's Stella-Della-Valley camp weekend, and our own Astronomy Day and UACNJ Symposium. We provide a Speakers Bureau for member clubs, Messier, Asteroid and Spectroscopic Certificates to qualifying observers, and maintain a web site which provides information on member clubs and links to all their web sites. Park is still one of the darkest sites in NJ, our membership has access to dark sky viewing along with sleeping and kitchen accommodations.

The second part of our mission, astronomy education, is addressed by maintaining an education center with a lecture room and a modest New Jersey astronomy museum. Free public programs are given from April through October on Saturday evenings from 8:00 to 10:30 p.m. These astronomy presentations are followed by public viewing at our observatory.

Because of the recent major flooding of our house at Jenny Jump, we are in the process of restoring things to a normal operating level now that the plumbing has been repaired. This involves the reorganization of our research library, sleeping accommodations, meeting room, bathroom, and kitchen facilities. We also have installed a freeze alarm to provide warning of low temperatures, and are in the *Con't. on Back*

Freeze Alarm Installed at Jenny Jump

Following the February 4, 2006 UACNJ Board of Directors Meeting at Jenny Jump, Karl Hricko (AAI) and Kevin Conod (NJAG) installed the organization's new "freeze alarm" at the house.

This unit monitors the temperature in the house and is programmed to call up to three members who live in the Jenny Jump area if it drops below a preset level. This alert is designed to help us prevent the kind of extensive damage resulting from last year's flood. A frozen pipe below the kitchen sink had burst, flooding the building and causing the ceiling to collapse in the displays area.

A new generator has also been housed in a small shed behind the house and the Board examined options for installing a switch. This will provide electricity to the furnace and house in the event of a power failure.

In March, Karl Hricko met with a plumber at the house who repaired the last of the leaks in the hot water heating loop upstairs and emergency shut-off valves installed.

Updating the UACNJ Speakers Bureau

It isn't always easy for amateur astronomy clubs to find speakers for their meetings and events - particularly smaller groups. The UACNJ Speakers Bureau was designed with the idea of providing member-clubs with a comprehensive list of possible presentations.
