DON'T MISS THE GREAT 2017 SOLAR ECLIPSE!

Join us at our facility in Jenny Jump State Forest from 12:30 to 4:00 PM on August 21 to observe the total solar eclipse. We will have solar telescopes and solar binoculars available for you to safely view the sun. Solar glasses can be purchased at our sales desk for \$2 and we will stream coverage of the path of totality in our lecture hall regardless of the weather.

A total eclipse hasn't occurred in the continental U.S. in nearly 40 years and we haven't seen a coast-to-coast event like this since 1918. Totality will be visible from Oregon to South Carolina. In New Jersey we are too far north to see the total eclipse. However the Garden State will see a partial solar eclipse with about 75% of the Sun covered by the Moon. If you watch the eclipse from High Point, you will see a slightly shorter 71% partial eclipse, while down at the tip of Cape May you will see a bit longer 78% partial eclipse.

Solar Eclipse Timings at UACNJ

Partial solar eclipse starts:	1:22 p.m.
Maximum eclipse:	2:45 p.m.
Partial eclipse ends:	4:00 p.m.

Eclipses occur when either the new moon passes between the Earth and the Sun (solar eclipse) or when the full moon passes through the Earth's shadow (lunar eclipse). Eclipses occur fairly frequently, but you have to be in the right place at the right time to view them. Total solar eclipses are a bit more rare, occurring on average every 18 months somewhere in the world; the next one in the US will cross from Texas to Maine on April 8, 2024.
