### ASTRONOMY DAY IN NEW JERSEY

This year the International Astronomy day event held at Sperry Observatory, and hosted by Amateur Astronomers, Inc., will be sponsored by the UACNJ. Amateur astronomers from all over New Jersey, and beyond, are invited to partake in this mini-symposium. Admission is free.

The two Sperry Observatory telescopes, a 24-inch Cassegrain Reflector, and a 10-inch Refractor, will be open for viewing all day and evening. The Refractor will be fitted with a Hydrogen-alpha filter for solar flare observations during the day. There will be a flea-market conducted by the Sheep Hill Astronomical Association, as well as other items for sale. There will be various displays from AAI committees, as well as from other New Jersey astronomy clubs, the Dark Sky Association, and the UACNJ. There will also be a workshop for kids and a raffle. Refreshments and directions to several close-by eateries will be available.

The event will take place at the Union County College auditorium and at the observatory, both on the Cranford campus, at 12:00 Noon. The speakers program will begin at 1:00 P.M. and run through 9:00 P.M., with a 6:00 P.M. dinner break. The following are some of those scheduled to give presentations: Dr. Mary Lou West from Montclair College, department of Astronomy, and member of Sheep Hill Astronomy Association, will speak on "Evidence for a Black Hole in the Milky Way"; Jordi Miralda of Princeton University will show us "How many Galaxies we see from naked eye to large telescopes"; Roger Tuthill will talk about the aspects of the up-coming July 11, 1991 Solar Eclipse viewed from Baja, Mexico; Joe Mina of the Delaware Valley Amateur Astronomers' talk is entitled "Where Have All the Stars Gone?", a presentation on the current status of light pollution; Ben Cavotta of the New Jersey Astronomical Association will present his topic entitled "New Jersey and J.P.L., Perfect Together", discussing aspects on down-linking space data via communications satellites; Al Witzgall of AAI and NJAA will present ideas on optics in photography; and astrophotographer Al Ernst of Amateur Astronomers, Inc., will be discussing "Deep Sky Photographic Techniques".



# SAVE THE WEEKEND OF JUNE 14-16

That is save it on your calendar for the 2nd Annual New Jersey StarQuest, hosted by the the Amateur Astronomers

Association of Princeton. This is the third annual state wide astronomical event that the UACNJ is helping to promote. But, before you say, "Who wants to spend a weekend observing down in Princeton?", just be aware that it's not held in Princeton, but rather at the 4-H camp in Beemerville, Sussex County (up in the northern, and darkest, part of the state).

The event will begin on Friday, June 14th, at 5 P.M., and run through Sunday the 16th. Where do you stay? The camp has barracks style bunking, camping and RV accommodations.

Key features will include: Stargazing at one of New Jersey's darkest sky locations; an organized Star Hop; an astronomical swap table, flea market style; slide presentations; a Saturday lecture; demonstrations; and a raffle. More Earthly daytime activities are also available: bird-watching; fossil hunting, Appalachian Trail hiking; and sports such as: fishing, volleyball, basketball, and ping-pong.

For the g-astronomers among you there will be six catered hot meals: Friday night brunch; hot breakfast and lunch, and a pig roast/beef barbecue dinner on Saturday; and a hot breakfast and pick-up lunch on Sunday.

Registration is \$20 per person with food costing \$26 per adult and \$18 per child 8 and under. But space is limited and the registration deadline is June 4, so register early.
