One light pollution problem arose about a year after the Jenny Jump project was begun. The AT&T microwave tower that is about 1/4 mile from the site underwent a conversion from evening red lights to 24-hour white xenon strobes in order to meet FAA regulations. Contacts were made with AT&T in September of '94 and were told that their new lighting was adversely affecting our observing site. They promised to put it in their work schedule. On April 15th it was noticed by several observers that, although the xenon light remains during

the day, after sunset it switches over to blinking red lights. A big thank you to AT&T.

The first public program was held on April 29th with Al Witzgall giving an excellent lecture on meteorites and providing a multitude of hands-on samples. Additionally, that night AAI held a star party under intermittently clear skies.

RAC Hosts 4th Annual Summer Star Party

This year the Rockland Astronomy Club is holding their 4th annual pre-Stellafane Summer Party and Family Camping Vacation. This years gathering takes place from Saturday July 22nd through Sunday July 30th at Shady Pines Campground in Savoy, Massachusetts.

The campground has some of the darkest skies found on the East Coast. The site is on a mountain top plateau, at an elevation of 2,200°. On the best nights, the sky has a limiting magnitude between 6.5 and 7.0.

The Shady Pines campground is clean and picturesque, with the center of attraction being a 35' x 70' spring fed swimming pool. Other facilities include a children's playground, teen game room, volley ball court, adult lounge, live entertainment on weekends and miles of trails for hiking. All campsites have water and electricity; some have sewers for recreational vehicles. For your pleasure there are two spotless restrooms with hot showers. The camp store has basic food stuffs as well as washers and dryers, there is also a supermarket about 10 minutes away.

A day trip to Stellafane is planned for Saturday, July 29th. It is only 90 miles from Shady Pines.
